Content:

ETHN 101 is an introduction course to help students understand the historical and contemporary issues of Persons of Color, with an emphasis on Native Americans and Latino Americans. The first half of the semester will introduce students to Native American Indian history, cultures, identities and contemporary issues of the American Indian, Native Alaskan and Native Hawaiian groups. The second half of the semester we will study Latino American history as well as topics that will range from colonialism, social formation, identity politics, and environmental issues. We will examine how these issues are used to show racial and ethnic stereotypes as well as to create a national identity.

- Understand the history of Native Americans and Latino Americans and how that history creates the present-day images of those communities.
- Understand the increasingly important role of Native Americans and Latino Americans in our daily lives.
